

What is SBHP?

SBHP is a training, dissemination and referral system aimed at expanding access to trained behavioral health providers for service members, veterans and their families.

The "Why?"

Unique Health Needs of Patient Population

- Nearly 66% of Veterans access their health care entirely in civilian settings,
- Veterans with a TBI, 89% had a comorbid psychiatric diagnosis – 44% to 54% with PTSD₂
- Increase in prevalence with medical conditions in Veterans













Ohio Veteran Demographics























KEY FACTS:

Ohio continues to be impacted by a significant increase in suicides in the population. From 2010-2019:

15,554 Ohioans died from suicide

2,717 Ohio Veterans died from suicide

The rate of suicide for Veterans increased by 49%

The rate of suicide for non-Veteran Ohioans increased by 21%

Firearms was the method used in 72.5% of Veteran suicides.

- Evaluate the impact of training civilian clinicians as well as the referral system for service members, veterans and their families.




















Program Tiers



Tier One (1 Day)

Training Topics

- SBHP Overview
- Military Culture
- Unique Perspective of Military Culture from someone who has served
- Impact of Deployment of Service Members and Families

Training is open to professionals and community members interested in learning more about working with service members, veterans and their families.





















Tier Two (2 Days)

Training Topics

- Sleep Disorders
- Identification, Prevention and Treatment of Suicidal Behavior
- Substance Use Problems
- PTSD
- Ethical Considerations
- Traumatic Brain Injury
- Military Families

Participants need to have completed <u>Tier</u>

<u>One</u>. Professionals working in the behavioral health, medical, social services, or clergy fields benefit from this training.

















Tier Three (1 and 2 Days)

TWO DAYS OF TRAINING PER TOPIC

- Cognitive Processing Therapy for PTSD
- Prolonged Exposure Therapy for PTSD
- Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Insomnia
- Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Depression
- Suicidal Ideation in the US Military

Participants must have completed both Tiers One and Two and be accepted into the registry to attend!

Eligibility Requirements

- Minimum of master's prepared & licensed in approved behavioral health field
- Tier One completion
- Acceptance of new clients
- Desire to treat service members, veterans & their families
- Complete online application
- Show proof of:
 - Licensure
 - Malpractice insurance










Participants by Profession


